

Just Mercy: Conversations to Spark a Redemptive Movement

Commission on a Way Forward...

As February approaches, my thoughts and my prayers turn to our upcoming special session of the General Conference in St. Louis, Missouri, February 23-26, 2019. The General Conference is the highest legislative body of The United Methodist Church. It is the only body that can “officially” speak for United Methodism. One of its chief responsibilities is to review and revise The United Methodist Book of Discipline as needed. Delegates to General Conference are elected by each of the Annual Conferences within the denomination. (Twelve of the 1000 total delegates are from East Ohio.)

The General Conference usually meets once a quadrennium (every four years), for approximately two weeks. In the last several meetings, it became apparent that our denomination is deeply divided on the issue of human sexuality, especially when it comes to matters of same-sex marriage and the ordination of LGBTQ individuals. As a result, the 2016 General Conference, at the suggestion of our bishops, referred the matter to a special commission, called the *Commission on a Way Forward*. This commission was made up of a wide range of individuals covering all aspects of the issues. Last spring, the commission released its report, including three possible plans:

1) *The Traditional Plan calls for basically no change other than to stiffen penalties for those violating the Discipline. The United Methodist Church would still forbid same-sex marriage and the ordination of practicing homosexuals. I believe this plan offers no solution to the divide that has existed in the past several conferences.*

2) *The Connectional Plan calls for three separate branches of the denomination, one that is quite conservative/traditional, one that is progressive, and a third that seeks to be moderate. I believe this might actually be worse than the Traditional Plan. Not only would it split the denomination, it would also cause a major division in a lot of churches as they argue over to which branch they should belong.*

3) *The One Church Plan calls for the elimination of all homophobic language from the Book of Discipline. It would allow for same-sex marriage at the discretion of the presiding clergy and the church in which the marriage might be performed. It leaves the question of ordination up to the individual conference. Basically, the One Church Plan leaves the issue of*

LGBTQ rights up to the individual consciences of the people involved. The One Church Plan was supported by the majority of the members of the Commission on a Way Forward and has been endorsed by the Council of Bishops. I believe it is the best plan for our denomination as a whole – for both progressive and conservative churches and members.

The Council of Bishops has now called a special session of the General Conference for this February. The sole purpose of this session will be to receive and act upon the report from the Commission on a Way Forward. This will not be an easy conference. There are traditionalists who do not accept that sexual orientation is not a matter of choice; and there are progressives who feel that none of these plans goes far enough toward full-inclusion. There will be amendments proposed on the floor of the conference seeking to change plans in various ways.

And so I pray. I pray for the church. I pray for our denomination. And I pray for our General Conference and its delegates. Most of all, I pray that God’s will be done. Please join me in prayer. Pray during the days leading up to General Conference and pray every day – February 23-26, 2019. Finally, pray that, in all things, God may be glorified. Amen.

4 Paws Facts:

At 4 Paws for Ability it costs at least \$40,000 to train and place a service dog with a disabled child. Costs include medical care, food, and training equipment.

Through our partial payment for service model, our families can pay or engage in fundraising activities to cover the fee. Fundraising is completed in the families' communities to help raise the fee. Very few families pay out of pocket for their service dog.

The fee for a service dog is \$17,000.

It costs about \$1,500 - \$2,000 to maintain a service dog each year, or about \$100 a month, for proper veterinary care, food, equipment, etc.

Youth Council was formed last spring to fulfill a directive of the Strategic Plan to build our youth program. Our goals are to assist our Youth Leader, Katie Chapman, and to help direct our NOUMC Youth Program.

Five of us (Rev. Mark, Wendy Cooper, Tammy Moore, Katie Chapman, and myself) have been attending the Small Church Cohort sponsored by our East Ohio Annual Conference. The purpose of the cohort is to help small churches build sustainable children and youth programs.

One of the first guidelines given to us was to create a mission statement. We will share that with you in the next Agape, as it is a work in progress. A second guideline was to build a master volunteer list. This is a list of the members (and attendees) of our congregation that are willing to help us once or twice a year by volunteering their services. That may mean working in the kitchen, setting-up for an event, chaperoning, sharing a talent, cleaning-up, or any other needed help. We have started creating the master list and will be calling you, if we haven't called you already!

The Youth Room has been painted, furnished, and made very attractive. In September we had a ribbon cutting ceremony to introduce the "new" room. Our youth were impressed to have an attractive space for themselves.
