I have never before written a book review as my newsletter column, but I have recently been reading a powerful and provocative book that I highly recommend: Red Letter Revolution: What If Jesus Really Meant What He Said? by Shane Claiborne and Tony Campolo (San Francisco, Harper Collins Publishing, 2012). The book begins with Claiborne and Campolo noting that the extreme religious right has "hijacked" the word evangelical and even to some extent the word Christian; and indeed the news media has largely contributed to the "hijacking." Thus, they state that there needs to be a designation for those who take the words of Jesus seriously, and apply them without apology to twenty-first century life, but those who would choose not to be associated with the exclusionist agenda of the extreme religious conservative movement. Thus the term: Red Letter Christians.

Starting in 1899, Bibles have been published that highlight the words of Jesus in red. Claiborne states: "We adopted the name. . . not only to differentiate ourselves from the social values generally associated with [extreme right-wing] evangelicals but also to emphasize that we are Christians who take the radical teaching of Jesus seriously and who are committed ing to his words? Campolo and Claiborne contend to living them out in our everyday lives." (Introduction Page xi.)

Throughout the 269 pages of this book, Claiborne and Campolo, in dialogue with each other, discuss such contemporary issues as hell, Islam, economics, family, abortion, the environment, women, racism, sexuality, immigration, and civil disobedi-


ence. (I note, this is not a book about the current political situation in Washington; it was published in 2012. Still, much of it seems to apply all the more in 2017.) This book has been endorsed by such people as: Former President Jimmy Carter; Archbishop Desmond Tutu; Eugene Peterson, author of the Message Bible; Phyllis



Tickle, a contemporary feminist theologian; Richard Rohr, O.F.M., Center for Action and Contemplation; and Brian McLaren, author and motivational speaker.

In recommending this book, I'm not suggesting that the reader will agree with every viewpoint espoused by Claiborne and Campolo. Still, they raise an interesting and provocative question: What if we really took all the words of Jesus seriously? What if we applied the Gospel in total to our decisions: personal, economic, political, social, environmental? What if we, as Christians really believed that Jesus meant what he said, and truly lived our lives accordthat the world would be a different place, a better place; and I agree. We are called to follow the teachings of Christ; and just maybe that means we are called to be Red Letter Christians. See you in church.

LIVING IN THE LIGHT

I struggled for a while with whether yoga works with Christianity. Its origin is the Hindu tradition, and its teachings are not from The Bible but from its own teachings, including the 196 Indian aphorisms in the Yoga Sutras written by Pantajali. I find the Sutras add to my understanding of humanity and strengthen my faith. For example, the first of the Yamas, rules to live by, is to do no harm to any being, one of the reasons many yogis are vegetarian. And when we bow to each other at the beginning and end of class, hands together at heart's center, it is a prayer and an acknowledgment that we all have the light of God inside ourselves, and that's to be honored. Jesus said we are to be a light to the world and to let our light shine, and Namaste (I bow to the light within you, which is also the light within me) emphasizes that light.

The yoga classes here at the church begin with scripture and meditation, and flow into breath and movement. We always end with relaxation and the universal chant of "Om" and a sweet Namaste. Sometimes we end with a prayer, and we always devote our practice to an intention, whether it's peace or love or something else. It's spiritual and meaningful, not a religion, but an enhancement to living well. It seems to further everything I believe in as a Christian as I try to live life as a prayer and be a light to the world.

Join us for Yoga for All, Sunday evenings at 6PM (a change from our original time of 7). This class is for all of you and for people in our community. A portion of the \$10 suggested donation goes to church ministries. May we be a light to the world.


