Building a Church for the Future: Stewardship Sunday

Sunday, November 11

Our 2018 Stewardship Campaign officially kicked-off on October 21, and Stewardship Sunday will be November 11. Our campaign will again focus on *Our Faithful Journey*, our Long Range Plan for the health and sustainability of our church. Our Guiding Principles have appeared in every bulletin and every newsletter since the plan was finalized a little over a year ago, and plans are currently underway for a meeting in early 2019 to assess our progress and set new goals as we continue on *Our Faithful Journey*.

As I review our 2018 Programs, we have made good progress. We have hired a youth leader and implemented a Youth Council; they are hard at work planning programs and projects. It takes time to build a strong youth program, but we have made a good start. While we have not hired an Adult Activities Coordinator, our Adult Council has been reinvigorated with a number of exciting opportunities for learning and fellowship. We have a social media coordinator in place, and our church has a presence on social media. Our goals that have not been met will be re-evaluated for 2019. It is exciting to witness the steady growth in our church; however, this has not come without cost.

Recognizing the need to move forward with *Our Faithful Journey*, our church adopted a 2018 budget that includes a \$12,000 shortfall. We are blessed to be able to absorb this shortfall from our General Fund; however, this cannot continue. Rev. Mark and our Finance Committee are committed to holding the 2019 budget at or near to the 2018 budget, with no significant increases. However, we need your help to make up the shortfall so we can continue on *Our Faithful Journey*. Please consider your current giving and, if you are able, please consider increasing that giving so we can both move forward with our Long Range Plan and enter 2019 with a balanced budget. Thanks for all you do to make *Our Faithful Journey* a reality.

Sunday School Mission Project: 4 Paws For Ability

As we continue our ongoing quest to learn what it means to be disciples of Christ, we find that the Bible tells us to "bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). This year, our youth are helping a child "bear their burden" by helping them purchase a service dog through 4 Paws For Ability. 4 Paws enriches the lives of children with disabilities by training and matching them with quality, task-trained service dogs which provide increased independence for children and assistance to their families. It costs at least \$40,000 to train and place a service dog with a disabled child; however, the families are only charged a fee of \$17,000. Knowing that this amount may still be financially impossible for a family to meet, 4 Paws allows and provides ways for the families to fund raise the amount needed to purchase a service dog. Although our youth will not be able to raise the entire amount of money it takes to obtain a puppy, the kids have set a goal of raising \$6,000 to help one child get a little bit closer to their goal! (As we normally raise between \$1,000-\$3,000, this is a huge goal for us, and we will need and appreciate all the help you can give us!) In the spring, 4 Paws will be notifying us of a child who we will be sponsoring, and we will be raising funds this year specifically for this child to receive a dog! Our first fundraiser for 4 Paws will be held on November 4: the kids will make and sell monkey bread!

Thank You, Kristie & Nike!

On September 30, we had two very special visitors in worship! Kristie, who is a Puppy Raiser for 4 Paws, brought Nike, a Papillon puppy that she is raising to be a service dog for **4 Paws for Ability**. Nike has been with Kristie for the past year and has just about completed his training. He was scheduled to go for his evaluation on October 4 and back to 4 Paws for advanced training; however, 4 Paws is in the process of evaluating several dogs, so Nike is still with Kristie, and they are continuing their training and socializing!





Puppy Raisers

All of the dogs that 4 Paws places as service dogs are bred and born at the 4 Paws Xenia, Ohio facility. After the puppies are born, they spend time together with their mothers, getting basic exposure to people, sights, and sounds through the Puppy Enrichment Program. The puppies are then placed in a puppy raiser's home, where they are taught basic obedience, house manners, and socialization until they are ready to return for advanced training around the age of one year old. 4 Paws supplies all of the tools and information necessary to be successful in puppy raising.

There are a few different ways to be a puppy raiser:

Traditional puppy raisers are individuals or families that foster a 4 Paws dog in their home.

Weekend puppy raisers are individuals or families who foster in their home over the weekend.

University puppy raisers are individuals in college who foster a 4 Paws dog on or off campus.

Puppy sitters are individuals or families who assist in puppy raising when the primary puppy raiser is away.

Tuesday, November 6, from 6:30 - 9 pm at Aldersgate UMC

"Conduct yourselves with all humility, gentleness, and patience. Accept each other with love, and make an effort to preserve the unity of the Spirit with the peace that ties you together." Ephesians 4:2-3

Most of you are aware that our denomination has struggled for decades with issues of human sexuality and exclusionary language in our *Book of Discipline*. You may be aware that, at the 2016 General Conference, a resolution was passed to form a commission to deal with and seek to resolve the conflicts around this issue. *The Commission on a Way Forward* was formed with representatives with broad perspectives on the issues. Discussion groups were held over the past year, both to provide feedback and further understanding among all the "players" in our United Methodist system; your pastor took part in these groups. The commission has met regularly since 2016, and last winter presented three possible plans to the Council of Bishops.

"The Council of Bishops recommends *The One Church Plan* because this plan best maximizes the presence of the United Methodist witness and encourages a generous unity by giving United Methodists the ability to address different missional contexts in ways that reflect their theological convictions... The One Church Plan removes the restrictive language from *The Book of Discipline* and adds assurances to pastors and Conferences who due to their theological convictions cannot perform same-sex weddings or ordain self-avowed practicing homosexuals" (Bishop Tracy S. Malone, *The Faithful Work of Finding a Way Forward*).

The Bishops have called a special General Conference in February 2019 to deal with these issues. Our conference is now conducting Listening Posts where we can provide feedback to our delegates to General Conference 2019. I am registered to attend the Listening Post on November 6 at Aldersgate UMC. You can read our bishop's full report, the final report from the Way Forward Commission, and register to attend a listening post at www.eocumc.com/bishop/faithful-work.html.

Finally, I ask that you pray for our church, our denomination, and our leaders as together we work to establish a "Way Forward."
