World Communion Sunday with Taizé Music

Sunday, October 2

You are invited to enjoy a new expression of music during worship on World Communion Sunday, October 2. In addition to our traditional forms of worship, Taizé music will be woven into the service as a way to enrich our time together.

Taizé (pronounced: tay-zay) is a prayerful form of music known for its simple, yet rich and meditative character. Taizé music often takes the structure of an ostinato (a simple melody that repeats over and over) and is meant to serve as a kind of musical centering prayer. Collective singing, piano, and guitar focusing on Taizé will add much to our worship experience on the 2nd.

The Taizé Community is an ecumenical monastic order in Taizé, Burgundy, France. It was originally composed of about 100 men who came from Protestant, Orthodox, and Catholic traditions. The men came

from about 30 countries across the world. The monastic order has maintained a strong devotion to peace and justice through prayer and meditation. It was founded in 1940 by Roger Schutz, a Protestant.

The community continues to be recognized as one of the world's most important sites of Christian pilgrimage. Over 100,000 young people from around the world make pilgrimages to Taizé each year for prayer, Bible study, sharing, and communal work. Through the community's ecumenical outlook, they are encouraged to live in the spirit of kindness, simplicity, and reconciliation.

The community, though Western European in origin, has sought to include people and traditions worldwide. They have sought to demonstrate this in the music and prayers where songs are sung in many languages, and have included chants and icons from the



Eastern Orthodox tradition. The music emphasizes simple phrases, usually lines from Psalms or other pieces of Scripture, repeated and sometimes also sung in canon. Earlier Taizé community music was conceived and

On World Communion Sunday, United Methodists, in conjunction with other denominations and believers worldwide, participate in communion to recognize our unity in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. This universal and inclusive connection is the foundation of the special offering for World Communion Sunday, one of six special offering Sundays in the life of The United Methodist Church.

50% of the offering provides scholarships for graduate students from the U.S. and other countries.

35% supports racial and ethnic scholarships for students pursuing ordained ministry (deacon or elder) and includes a mentoring program.

A Note from the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC)
